The 2023 Trout Derby will officially open April 22 at more than 100 stocked lakes and run through Oct. 31. Over 90 participating

businesses are offering 872 donated prizes valued at more than \$41,500. The average prize value is up to about \$48, which is an increase of more than \$20 from when the derby started.

You can claim your prize by filling out the form for a winning fish at wdfwderby.com. You'll need the tag number, lake, date of catch, and your contact info.



Getting started in the derby is easy: The derby is open to anyone with a valid 2023 fishing license, though temporary licenses are not valid for game fish species from April 22-29. There is no entrance fee or registration required. You just catch a tagged trout anytime between April 22 and Oct. 31 and you win. Plus, children age 14 and under fish free!



Education Committee

Have you heard the term match the hatch? Suggestive, imitative, stimulator, or attractor patterns? Take a trip to a fly shop and stare at the bins of flies for a while, and to prevent embarrassment, we just walk out the same door we entered. Fly fishing is intimidating enough, and when it comes to purchasing flies, it can be -well, a bit daunting. This article is

for the new fly fisher preparing to make their first purchase or looking to add patterns to their fly box. There are thousands of fly patterns to choose from, and since you have to start somewhere, I recommend you start with these seven patterns. The patterns work exceptionally well in our lakes and streams, even worldwide, as they elicit strikes.

- 1. Wolly Bugger, Size 8 in black or olive with a bead head or cone. Who knows what this fly imitates? It could be a leach, dragonfly, or stonefly nymph. The action that the fly imparts elicits strikes from trout. Fish it in a lake or stream by itself or with a trailing nymph like the Pheasant tail (see below); it makes a tasty morsel for fish, which is what this sport is about.
- 2. Pats Rubber legs, Size 8/10 in darker colors back, brown, olive, or black/tan
 This fly is a delivery system to get to the bottom of the river fast. It imitates stone flies and resides in all of my fly boxes. Fun fact, when guides and fly shops place orders with manufacturers, this fly is often the first fly sold out. The Pats Rubber legs could also be paired with a trailing nymph if you choose
- 3. Pheasant tail, size 14-18 (with flashback), with or without a bead head.

 A common nymph that works in local waters; a substitute would be the Prince Nymph. I purchase these two flies in sizes 16-20
- 4. Hares Ear (Bead head Flashback Gold Ribbed Hares Ear), size 14-16. The Hares Ear has been around for decades and is as relevant today as the day it was introduced—an excellent fly to imitate Callibaetis and Mayflies in lakes or streams. The name of this fly tells you the construction pattern if you were a fly tier. The sparkle of the flashback is added for attraction, and the gold ribbing is to imitate segmentation found on a nymph. Any Hares Ear pattern with or without a bead head will work for attracting trout.

Top water flies:

5. Chubby Chernobyl, size 10, Golden/yellow pattern.

This sizeable dry fly imitates Stone, Salmon, Skwala, Golden Stone flies, and even grasshoppers. You can tie a trailing nymph underneath to fish, a strategy called dry-dropper. It floats well and is easy to see on the water. This fly comes in many body colors, and I recommend purchasing many of these variants. Brown, olive, black, red, and purple will work any day. The Micro Chubby Chernobyl is also available as an additional choice for purchase later. Size 14 would be a good size for the Micro Chubby Chernobyl.

- 6. Parachute Adams with a post (white or pink), size 14 or 16, in gray or tan. The purpose of the post is to allow you to see the fly on the water quickly. The Purple Haze pattern of this fly is very effective on our local waters. You must add floatant to keep this fly and the next on top of the water.
- 7. Elk Hair Caddis, size 14, in tan or olive.

The caddis is an excellent choice to fish in the afternoon and late evenings as the nymph emerges to its adult stage on our lakes and streams.

So, there you have it, seven fly patterns that will fit in the palm of your hand. Flies are a never-ending expense to this sport. You will lose your flies in the trees, the bottom of the river, and even the trout of a lifetime. Enjoy!



SFF Library's Book of the Month

DYNAMIC Nymphing

by George Daniel Stackpole Books, 2011

George Daniel is probably best known as a leading US exponent of the "tight line" or "contact" nymph fishing technique commonly

called Euronymphing. Before his video tutorials became ubiquitous on YouTube, he wrote this book, which laid out Czech, Polish, French and Spanish nymphing techniques for the first time to a general American fly fishing audience. But the book also provides comprehensive instruction in the traditional methods of fishing with nymphs on a tight line pioneered by George Harvey and Joe Humphreys in early and middle 1900s as well as "suspension nymphing" – fishing a nymph suspended under a buoyant dry fly or strike indicator (such as a Thingamabobber))

When I use the word "comprehensive" here, I'm not exaggerating. Daniel attempts to cover everything – from choice of rods and reels to rigging lines, leaders, tippets and indicators to casting to fly placement to presentation to fly patterns – all customized for a long list of specialized stream conditions and nymphing methods. This compacts a lot of information into the book's 248 pages, which are illustrated with step-by-step color photographs and excellent line drawings. The result is a dense book with much to teach and no words to waste. It does not lend itself to casual skimming. Better to read this book normally once, then go back and carefully parse the well-organized chapters that cover the topics of most interest to you. For the chapters on casting, it would probably be ideal to have access to a rigged flyrod and some casting space if, like me, the printed word isn't the best way for you to learn a kinetic skill like fly casting.

The book begins with the author explaining why we should bother nymphing at all. As one who took a while to move on from the mindset of, "if I'm gonna get skunked, I'll get skunked on a dry fly," this was a good reminder that the trout's prey spends most of its time under water and fish get most of their calories there. He then discusses how streams are "dynamic" systems with confused and confusing currents and flows always in flux. Recognizing this, he makes the excellent point that fishers should learn and employ various techniques so they can adjust to differing conditions and get the fly to a place where a trout can find and eat it. He also defends competitive fly fishing which is something many of us are not positive about. Maybe the best argument Daniel makes for it is that, like auto racing teams, competitive fishers test and adopt new things (like tungsten beadhead nymphs) and introduce them to the rest of us.

After extolling the virtues of simplifying our array of gear, Daniel describes some fairly complicated formulae for the leaders, tippets and indicators (both suspension and in-line sighter types) for various streamside situations. One suggestion I was convinced to take is to tie up several different tippet/fly rigs and carry them onstream to allow faster changes.

He does a good job explaining the value and use of tippet rings, another Euronymphing innovation that can be adapted to other styles of fishing.

The book then moves into a discussion of casting, focused on tricks for getting weighted nymphs into the water upstream of where the fish are thought to be and sinking to the desired depth in as short a time as possible. One misconception about Euronymphing is that it takes casting out of the gameplan in favor of simply lobbing weight into the water as with a spinning rod. As Daniel explains, it's quite a bit more sophisticated than that and he fairly simply describes how to adapt basic fly casting techniques to the use of monofilament line and weighted nymphs.

In the next chapter, he describes several specialized casts, such the venerable tuck cast for getting a nymph to drop straight down into the water with enough slack to get it to the bottom before the current can grab it and drag it downstream. He follows up with methods for casting nymph rigs for longer and shorter distances (where the lob cast actually is used), and more specialized situations. These sections are particularly well organized — the casting techniques are combined with the choices of fly and fishing tactics (dead drift v. lifting v. active retrieve, for example) with which they are used.

This chapter on tight line methods is followed by a very good chapter about fishing nymphs suspended under a floating indicator, which keeps the nymphs at a constant depth below the water surface. Interestingly, this method is illegal in competitive fly fishing, which is why Euronymphing developed there. The author chides some of his European and Eastern fishing friends who express disdain for such "bobber fishing," pointing out that many large western rivers cannot be effectively fished by a wading Euronympher casting 20-40 feet into fast currents. While I would hesitate to recommend some parts of this book to a novice, this chapter on suspension nymphing is useful for fishers of any experience level who want to learn or improve on their skills with dry dropper or floating indicator methods.

Chapter 6 on nymph patterns is also very good. Daniel generally advocates for carrying a smaller variety of generalist, impressionistic patterns rather than a wide variety of flies tied to precisely imitate particular hatches. Included are photos and recipes for 72 fly patterns mostly following this preference. These flies can be tied quickly, reducing the investment lost when nymphs snagged and broken off as nymphs unavoidably are.

The final three chapters cover methods for approaching specialized situations: pocketwater, riffles, runs, pools, high water, muddy water, low water, small brushy streams, etc. One of my favorite bits from this section of the book is the clear instruction (with great photos) of two variations of the bow and arrow cast. I admit I have never actually seen this done and wondered if it was just a party trick. Still, maybe I'll try to figure it out because...well, why not?

And that, for me, sums up the best reason to read "Dynamic Nymphing." Even if you have no intention of shelling out the cash to buy a long, 3 weight rod and the other gear you might need to begin Euronymphing, George Daniel gives us a lot of ideas to play around with in this book, many of which are applicable to any style of nymphing and some of which just seem like fun things to try.

Beginning Fly Tying Pattern

Euro Nymphs - CDC Red Tag

Presented by Rolf Marsh

Materials: (to Order Material, click the links below)



Hook: <u>Firestick #551 #12-16</u>Thread: Veevus 10/0, Black

Bead: Slotted Silver or Gold Tungsten

Tail: <u>Danville Floss, Red</u>
Rib: <u>Red Wire Brassie</u>

Abdomen: Red Fox Squirrel fur

Collar: CDC Medium Gray Dun

Thorax: Peacock Herl

This pattern is attributed to Andy Larkin of Cobble Hill, Vancouver Island in British Columbia.

Andy is an innovative fly tier and is also involved in competitive fly fishing. The pattern is also marketed by Fulling Mill using a design by Kieron Jenkins, who is a talented British fly tier and competitive angler for Great Britain. Currently, he is the manager of Digital Marketing at Fulling Mill. However, these patterns may have been adapted from Czech patterns that were used during fishing competitions prior to 2010 utilizing a red tag of craft fur, a peacock herl body, and a partridge soft hackle tied behind a gold bead. A similar pattern is the Blowtorch as tied by Devon Olsen and marketed by Umpqua Feather Merchants. Devin indicates that this pattern was instrumental in his 1st and 2nd places within the 2014 World Championships.




Notes: Euro Nymphs are generally a nymph with an oversized tungsten bead and some leadfree wire behind the bead. They are tied on wide gap competition style hooks, particularly jig hooks, utilizing a sparse amount of body materials. The focus of Euro Nymphs is to sink fast to the slower currents of the bottom and stay there throughout the drift. The patterns are tied with a broad range of bead sizes to accomodate a variety of water speeds, depths, and types of water. This chart will assist you in selecting the proper bead.

Hook Size	#10	#12	#14	#16	#18
Lighter Bead	3.3mm (1/8")	2.8mm (7/64")	2.3mm (3/32")	2.0mm (5/64")	1.5mm (1/16")

To keep track of the bead weight that is being used, some will color code their flies with a thread collar. Within the above chart, you could use Orange thread for the lighter beads, Red thread for the medium beads, and Dark Brown thread for the heavy beads. This will give you three weight possibilities for each hook size. Another method is to purchase a gram scale (0.01g accuracy). These scales cost only about \$20.00 and will give you an accurate weight for the nymph rig you use. I have many euro nymphs listed within the Fly Fishing the Sierra flybox such as Egan's Iron Lotus, Rainbow Warrior, and his Frenchie; Walt's Worm, Olson's Blowtorch, Perdigon, and TP's Skinny Nelson. These are streamlined and heavily weighted to reach the bottom fast. The patterns could represent mayfly or caddis nymphs or just an attractor. Other patterns such as weighted eggs, heavy stoneflies, weighted San Juan Worms or Squirmy Wormies and Mops are also used within the Euro nymph rig. The heaviest fly can be either as a point fly or a dropper depending on how you wish to present the rig within the water column. I like to keep my heaviest fly on the dropper so that both flies are bouncing off the bottom. 3 fly rigs often end up with a lot of control issues (tangles), so I try to stay with a simple 2 fly Euro rig. This is tightline nymphing, a 3 or 4 weight rod that is 10 to 11 feet long is ideal.

Intermediate/Advanced Fly Tying Pattern

Balanced Leech



Materials:

Hook: Daiichi 4660 size 6-8 or Daiichi 4640 size 10-12

•Thread: Uni-thread 6/0, Black

•Tail: Black Marabou with Speck Copper Flashabou

•Body: Arizona Simi Seal, Blood Leech

•Bead: 1/8" Tungsten Gold Bead on straight pin lashed to

hook.

Notes: The Balanced Leech came from the efforts of Jerry McBride of Spokane, Washington around 2005. Jerry looked for a way to suspend the hook in a horizontal position and was inspired by a discussion of lashing beadheads to hooks with pins in Leeson and Schollmeyer's Fly Tier's Benchside Reference (page 431). The Benchside discussion had bent the pin so that the bead was positioned above the shank and would turn the hook upside-down. Jerry kept the pin straight and extended beyond the eye of the hook so that the hook would not only ride upside down but also be balanced within a horizontal position. Pins worked great on small beadheads and hooks smaller than size 10.

Larger patterns, particularly those using coneheads, require a larger and heavier brad to suit the purpose. Jerry applied the "Balanced" concept to a number of stillwater beadhead patterns. Phil Rowley was instrumental in bringing popularity of the pattern to many anglers with his series of Balanced Leeches on You Tube.



The Mohair Leech pattern using Arizona Simi Seal became quite popular around 2005 with the many different colorations that John Rohmer developed. The materials have such a strong following that the pattern developed it's own name, the Simi Seal Leech. In addition, jig style hooks with either a 60 degree or 90 degree eye were starting to be utilized within the fly fishing community. Together, these hooks and materials work well to provide a larger Balanced Leech in sizes 4-10 for trophy lakes such as Crowley, Davis, and Pyramid. Sparkle Chenille, Angora Goat, along with some flash material such as Wing N' Flash will also provide excellent bodies for the Balanced Leech.

One popular pattern at Lake Pyramid is the Midnight Cowboy. Often you will find this tied with a Sparkle Chenille (Midnight Fire) having bits of Blue and Red mylar within the chenille. However, the pattern can also be tied with Black/Blue and Black/Red Simi Seal.

Do not attempt to pay dues prior to receiving our payment due notice.

Those who have pre-paid accounts (Lifetime members, Honorary Members, and those with Award paid memberships) will not receive payment notices.

In past years, the club has been kind of loose on late payments, with some of the members waiting until October to pay a dues bill that was due during the month of June. We can't do that anymore. We aren't a rich club, and we have a whole summer where our expenses continue, but there are no special events to help pay the bills. We need that income in the bank at the start of our fiscal year, the month of June, the start of Summer. If a payment is more than 30 days late, your membership will be cancelled. If payments tend to be late this coming year we will explore adding late payment fees in coming years. Its up to you folks.



St. Joe River Outing 2023

Directions #1: There are two main ways to reach St. Joe & Fly Flat Campground. Easiest & longest is via St Maries, ID. Take Dishman-Mica Road south to the intersection of WA-27. Turn right takes you to the sign to "Rockford" where you take a left (Emma St) into Rockford. Go a short distance; take a right onto to WA-278 S. which takes you into Idaho, & the road now becomes ID-58E. You will later merge onto US-95 S to Plummer, ID. Entering Plummer you will see "St. Maries/I-5E" sign, turn left onto Cedar St & remain on I-5E.



You enter St. Maries on I-5E [It is highly recommend you fill up your car with gas in St. Maries.] which becomes Main St. Turn right on 4th, go one block turn left onto College St. & look for the sign to "Harrison," & turn left onto 3rd St which becomes ID-3. Cross over the St. Joe River, go until you see the sign to "Avery," turn right & stay on St. Joe River Road to Avery. Allow time to stop at "The Idaho Fly Fishing Company" in Avery for a sandwich or ice cream and pick up a few flies. Licenses are available across the road at Sheffey's Store as is soda, beer, ice and pricey gas! The Fly Flat Campground is about 30 miles from Avery on St. Joe River Rd. Turn right across the bridge on Red Ives Rd. 218 and go 3.4 miles to campground.

Directions #2: Take I-90 to St. Regis, MT, & head over the mountain. Get gas & a fishing license at Cantrell's Fly Shop, just north of town. Exit freeway & take a left to the four-way. Left again & go about a mile to Little Joe RD. Left again for 28 miles, left just past mile marker #77. The 14 mile Montana side is gravel that can get a bit rough and dusty.

Campsite: Fly Flat CG has 14 sites suitable for tents & small-medium trailers. Some have CARE-FULLY maneuvered larger RV's & 5th wheelers. Two well maintained outhouses & a pump with sometimes cloudy, but potable water. Please be prepared to share camp sites as we can get cozy with all the folks on this outing. Look for the club banner.

Mosquitoes are always a possibility, be prepared with repellents if they bother you.

There is a chance that we won't be able to find room at Fly Flat as there are no reservations available. In this case we'll be spreading out to one of the nearby campsites in the neighborhood.

Flies: The "Joe" is a fine cutthroat fishery with fish ranging from 8-18 inches. Primarily a dry fly fishery, nymphs can also be very successful. Size can be an important factor with insects smaller in size at this time of year.

Many patterns will work on the St. Joe. Presentation is often more important than the specific fly chosen. Drag free drift will provide the greatest number of opportunities.

Flies in the size range of: 14's, 16's, 18's are good choices unless otherwise noted.

Choices: Elk Hair Caddis in tan; Adams; Parachute Adams; Purple Haze Parachutes; Yellow Sallies; Comparadun's Tan, Olive; Stimulators 10, 12, 14; yellow, orange; Humpies in tan, red, orange; Turk's Tarantula's 10,12,14 tan, olive, grey with a small nymph dropper; Swing soft hackles during evening, there are many choices. Don't overlook Hoppers, yellow, tan, Joe's Hoppers, Ants in black, Bees, size 12,14, Rusty Spinners, Beatles, Foam flies; Chubby Chernobyl's, Royal Trudes, Royal Wulffs and more.

Lake/River Report Updates: Silverbow (924-9998) website has weekly updates on the Joe, along with recommended flies.

Special Note: This is a great chance for the novice fisher, as cuts are always hungry & we will have plenty of "experts" available. It is a relatively easy river for wading & it should be warm enough, but always bring a variety of clothing. The river is cool in the early morning and waders are often worn. However during the day "wet" wading is very popular as it can be hot out.

Meals: To be announced. Host will update.

This is the longer way but the road is usually better. It's a washboard road either way you come to the campsite. It will take 4 to 6 hours to get there depending on what type of rig you're in. I tow a 25.5 foot fifth wheel and have no problems with access.



Special Note: If you are unfamiliar with an outing location, be sure to have a paper map with you, along with these instructions. Smartphone apps like Waze and Google maps are great, but don't rely on them 100% as there is no service anywhere near your destination.

Campsite: We will be camping at Kelly Forks Campground which is the confluence of Kelly Creek and the North Fork of the Clearwater River. Good water and clean restrooms with shady campsites. Tents and light or smaller trailers are the norm. Reservations have not been required for the last couple of years but it might not be a good idea since post covid activity may be higher.

Flies: Parachute Adams size 16-18, Purple Haze size 16-18, Elk hair Caddis size 12-14. Red ants, and Hoppers Deer or Elk hair preferred. Bring an assortment-every year varies.



Long Lake, Ferry **County Outing 2023**

Date: September 15 – 17, 2023

Directions: Access: 7.5 miles south of Re-



Continue on for several hundred more yards until you see the Long Lake campground entrance on your right.

Boating and Fishing Information: Long Lake has a boat launch. Fly fishing only. Motorized boats are permitted. This is a small, deep lake that is ideal for novice fly fishers. The lake has a healthy population of west slope cutthroat. The fishing locations are varied, with weeded shallows, small flats with gravel/mud bottoms, and sheer drop-offs along scree slides. Evenings after warmer days can result in wonderful hatches, with fish taking dries merely inches out from the scree shorelines, as well as over the flats. During the midday hours, trolling small streamers behind a sink-tip or full-sinking line can be productive. While fishing here I have been visited by loons (which pop up at boatside (making a mockery of the "keep your distance..." sign on shore), beaver, mink, bald eagles, and ospreys. I've also seen bighorn sheep on the mountain sides bordering the lake. Novices can practice unhindered fly casting on a gravel beach, catching fish while they learn! A wonderful fishing site made all the better by the forgiving west slope cutts.

Campgrounds & Lodging: Maintained by the US Forest Service, Long Lake's campgrounds provide hand water pumps, bear-proof trash containers, fire grills, picnic tables, and well-maintained handicap accessible toilets. There are 12 tent and trailer sites available. For non-campers, motel accommodations are available nearby in Republic and Curlew, Washington.

Sign In: Please check in with the host, and make sure you have signed the club's waiver form.

Flies: This is a good lake for the old standards! Dries: Elk Hair Caddis, Humpies, Adams, Light Cahills or similar, in sizes 10 – 16. Wets: Hare's Ears, Pheasant Tails, damsel nymphs, Olive Willies, and scud patterns, sizes 10 -14, near the weedy areas. Streamers: small leeches and woolly buggers in black, olive, and brown. I tie a woolly with a peacock hurl body, furnace/brown hackle, and a hot-orange marabou tail that is a real taker. Also, a scud with a fluorescent-pink chenille body and a hurl shellback, has been another taker when there is no apparent activity on the water.

How To Find and Email Fellow Club Members on the Web Page

Most of you may remember when the Club had a paper directory of members that could be used to find and communicate with other members in the club. That came to an end a while back due to increasing costs, and the plan to bring on the new website that would include a directory. Also, with a paper directory it only listed a "flash picture" of names, addresses and emails on the day the directory went to the printshop. No new members or address changes were seen. Now that our website is up and working, we have a directory that is inclusive of all members as of the day you search. It is always up to date.



The web directory is, however, a new experience for many, and knowing how to navigate it and use it is important to get the best experience. We thought we would help with one area that has come up in questions from the members. The question is, "Why are there no email addresses, and how do I contact a member without the email address?"

First, the reason there are no email addresses shown, except for your own. The Congress passed a new privacy law a couple of years ago called the CAN-SPAM Act. That law makes it illegal for any business or public entity to establish a list of email addresses on their websites. SFF is considered a business, though a non-profit one. This is to assure that such a list cannot be stolen and used to harass the folks on the list. However, your email address is in our database under very tight security and is only available to Administrators on an as needed basis. The system also uses it to verify your identity when you log in.

So, how do you send an email to a member when you can't see his email address? Well, it's quite easy. Here is the process, step-by-step.,

- 1. Log into the website with your password at: http://spokaneflyfishers.com
- 2. After you log in, go up to the top of the page and click on the RESOURCES heading and then select MEMBER DIRECTORY. Note: If you are using a smartphone you click on the 3-Bar icon and select Resources, then Member Directory.
- 3. Enter either the first or last name of the person you want to contact into the SEARCH box and hit your Enter Key. Do the same on a smartphone, but just click on the Search button.
- 4. On a desktop or laptop, you will see a box with the person's name (and maybe others also). Click on the box for the correct person and you will see the person's profile. Smartphone users will have already seen the profile.

- 5. Near the bottom, click on the blue "Send a Message" and you will get sent to an email form.
- 6. At the top of the form, you should fill in the subject of the email.
- 7. In the main box on the form, you can type in your message to the person. At the top of this box there are controls for Adding Bold, Italic, or underline, or adjusting the position of the type on the page, if you need them.
- 8. When done, click on the "Preview & Send" button and you will see what the final email will look like.
- 9. If you like what you see, just click on the SEND button, or if you want to do some editing, click on the EDIT button.

Your message has now been sent, and as you can see, you never had to see the email address. It was privately addressed for you by the system.

You all got notices, and hopefully you logged in and checked it out to see what was up. We hope you liked what you saw. But you might have asked, "what does this have to do with me?"

Well, it has a lot to do with every member of the club going forward. The website is a lot more than a pretty way to present out club to the public, but it also will act as the central place where your membership records will exist, a place where you can see the schedule of upcoming meetings, outings, special events, and classes, that is, when we can again have such things again. It is the engine that helps the club

communicate with the members with its mass email processor. It is also the place where you will pay for various events, classes, or membership renewals. We will only do in-person payments at our special events indoors, like the Fly Auction and Raffle. We actually would prefer that most people use this method of payment rather than mailing in payments. And there is a lot more that you may find as you look around on the website.



If you didn't log in yet, please do it <u>immediately</u>, as it is important that you verify the information on this site that we have recorded for your name, address, email, phone numbers, etc. Logging in also assures that you have a personal password for getting into the members only part of the site going forward. If you haven't logged in please do it <u>now</u>. The website will provide you a password. <u>DO NOT try to use your</u>

own password until you have at least logged in once.



Once you are inside, while on your account page, you can change the password, if you want, to anything you prefer by clicking the password "change" button. You can also keep using the password the site gives you, with a full assurance that you are the only person who knows what it is, so it is very secure and safe. Just

write it down somewhere because we can't help you to remember it. We don't know it. If you lose it you can request a new one when you log in.

We use this member information that you provide for our mailing list for the Barbless Flyer newsletter and club notices, and for keeping our Member Directory up to date. It is also used to help evaluate our membership, count our members, and manage our billing for renewals and to assure that you get receipts for your payments. Needless to say, it is a critical part of your membership to have logged into the site at least once.

This month we'd also like to focus a little on the new Member Directory that is on the site under the "Resources" menu. Truly a valuable resource for all members, as it replaces the bound paper club directory that we used to publish each year. That was a difficult task, and the cost was high, with printing and postage for 265 members at that time.


The directory that is now available to all members on the website has the same information and is now available on your computer, your laptop, your pad, or your

cell phone for instant access anywhere you are. Also, every member can now change his or her information whenever they want. So, if you move, change a phone number, or even a name, you can do that any time and the directory will then be up to date. You change your information by clicking on the "My Account" button which takes you to the same screen that you see when you log in. Just change your information and click on the Save and Continue button.



To find someone in the Directory, you have several options. The member names are each in boxes that are organized by member first names, alphabetically. You will see that "Al" is the first one. We don't particularly like this arrangement, but it is the way the software works. There are other options that are much better. The Search box in the graphic to the left lets you put in the last name of the person you are looking for and it will come

up, which we suspect will be the most common usage. You can also enter a first name, if you like. You can click on the "search by location" menu and it will drop down to show you a list of distances from your location.



Let's say that you would like to fish with someone who lives within 5 miles of your home. The example to the left shows such a search for a person living in Spokane Valley. The directory knows where you live, so it will put in the correct city. The search will then bring up all the folks who live within 5 miles of your house. As you can see in the menu, you can also search for people in a particular city.


So, you are now an expert on use of the Directory.
