

Spokane author, photographer, fishing guide, casting instructor and teacher (whew!) **Chip O'Brien** will present his program called "**One Year, Six States – My Redemptive Year"** at our regular monthly meeting on January 11th at 7pm. As usual, we'll meet at St Francis of Assisi Catholic Church, 1104 W Heroy, Spokane.

Chip says this program is "a celebration of fly fishing the American West, but it also touches upon the often-overlooked capacity of fly fishing to restore a soul ravaged by some of the inevitable downsides of life."

According to Chip, his redemptive year began after "life had handed me a

turd sandwich." This program will display Chip's well-honed story-telling skills and beautiful photography to share the how-to's and where-to.s of fishing water both familiar and obscure in California, Oregon. Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming while telling the story of "how fly fishing, time and a pack of understanding fishing buddies brought me back, you could even say saved my soul."

Chip's journey so far has followed a path set early in his life. When he was 10, he caught his first fish on a bamboo fly rod through what he calls "a complete coincidence" and never looked back. A bit later his mother suggested that he should be a writer. And, like the fateful mashup between chocolate and peanut butter that created Reeses, a fly-fishing writer was born. Chip's first article was published over 30 years ago and since then he has published hundreds of articles in many fly fishing and outdoors magazines as well as several books. In his "spare time" he guided fishermen in N. California for 14 years, taught writing in Oregon for 10 years, became a certified casting instructor and fished all over the known world. He recently learned the art of euronymphing and is now mastering trout spey techniques. Chip moved to Spokane in 2016 to be closer to family and because "the fact there's terrific fishing around here just made a move to Spokane irresistable."

We Want to Know What You Think

As the Club has gotten back on its feet in the aftermath of COVID, a group of volunteers who are new to leadership has joined the Board of Directors and stepped up to chair our major committees.

Membership is growing overall, after some members dropped away during the pandemic. And, of course, the world around us has continued to change. This seems to be as good a time as any for you, the members of Spokane Fly Fishers Club, to weigh in and tell leadership how the Club can better help you enjoy and draw meaning from fly fishing.

The Board recently authorized the formation of an ad hoc working group to put together recommendations for ways to increase membership participation in and satisfaction with the Club. This group is working to gather members' input on a variety of topics that correspond to the subjects covered by some of our major committees – Membership, Outings, Education, Conservation, Publications and Programs. 2024 Fly Fishing School

The SFF Fly Fishing School starts on February 29th and again includes a great lineup of program presenters who will provide both indoor and outdoor instruction. The indoor sessions will be held at the Inland Northwest Wildlife Council Building at 6116 North Market Street.

Indoor class times are 6:00pm to approx. 8:30pm as follows:

Class #1 Thursday, February 29th (Equipment)

Class #2 Thursday, March 7th (Knot Tying)

Class #3 Thursday, March 14th (Entomology)

Class #4 Thursday, March 28th (Moving Water - Streams and Rivers)

Class #5 Thursday, March 21st (Still Water - Lakes and Ponds)

Class #6 Thursday, April 4th (Water Safety)

Class #7 Thursday, April 11th (Fish ID and Conservation)



Outdoor Casting Classes are held on three Saturdays in March at Franklin Park (Division and Queen - North Spokane) from 9:00am to 11:00am.

Casting Class #3 -April 6th

The final class (#8) is Saturday, **April 13**th at Waterfront Park, Medical Lake, WA (9:00am – 12noon.) This class includes additional basic field instruction as well as casting on the water. We may need to relocate due to tree destruction and removal from the August fires.

Winter Fly Fishing Experience - Part 2

Winter fly fishing has some unique challenges you typically do not encounter during other seasons. Fish are predictable and often in softer "winter" water. The flow rate is slow and clear. Fly selection is different, and your fly rod guides will ice up. Allow me to assist you in overcoming some of these challenges with a few winter tips.

Tip number 1. Fish the warmest part of the day. Fish react predictably to water temperature. Since fish are poikilotherms (cold-blooded), their metabolism is significantly slower in winter. They appear more lethargic in their movement patterns. Your casting has to be precise. It is rare for a trout to chase down a fly in winter. The fish are not very active, so the best times to fish in the winter are from 11:00 am to 3:00 pm. A few degrees warmer water temperature makes a big difference in eliciting a strike. In the winter, the sun, which produces heat, is your friend.

Tip number 2. Lower metabolism equals soft, slow water. The colder the water, the lower a fish's metabolism. You will find your target prey in the slow-moving, almost pillowy water, and they will be deep or near the bottom of the river. Because of their lower metabolism in the cooler months, fish will not chase a nymph or dry fly like in the summer. Skip the faster water and skip the riffles. Fish in the winter are very conservative in their movement behaviors. Look for slow, deep pools, side channels, and slow-moving seams along the banks. These are the water types you are seeking.

Tip number 3. Limit your bug selection.

Most days in the winter, there is little bug activity. In the winter, ninety percent of your fishing will be nymphing or streamers. If there is a hatch, it will typically be a Midge hatch. If you get a warmer day, say above 30 degrees, you may get some midge activity; in that case, you can throw on a dry fly. Two of my favorite midge dry flies are a Griffiths gnat or a suspended midge in sizes 18-22. I fish two nymphs if the regulations allow. On my point fly, I will tie on a heavier fly as an attractor, and this assists in getting my flies to depth quicker. My tag fly is eight to twelve inches above my point fly. My tag fly is typically a zebra midge size 18-22. Nymphing eggs and scuds can also work well in the winter months. If you want to try streamers, go with a small leach pattern or wooly bugger.

Tip number 4. Dead Drift and Water Types

I typically downsize my tippet in the winter from a 5x to a size 6x fluorocarbon. The fluorocarbon is a bit more stealthy and abrasion-resistant. This smaller tippet allows my flies to drift drag-free better. Concentrate, keep your casting and flies in the seam. If you are not sure what water to seek, I suggest tail waters or anything with a dam on it. The water temperature from a dam will be more constant in temperature and will likely not ice up like a freestone river. Spring creeks and rivers would be good choices, too, as they are less likely to freeze. Anytime you find a hot spring dumping into the river, fish will stack up in the warmer water. Typically, the water flows will be the lowest of the year, and hydrodynamics are straightforward. While this aids a newer fisherman due to the slower, lower volume of water, the water clarity necessitates slower and more deliberate movement on your part. Scared fish do not eat.

Tip number 5. Ice in your guides

As the temperature drops below freezing, the water from your fly line will begin to freeze in your rod guides, which can be frustrating. There are a couple of solutions you can try. No one fix for ice-free rod guides in winter fishing works. One thing you can do is put your rod in the water and give it a little shake. The ice will loosen up, and you can shake it off. This technique allows you to get back into casting for several more drifts. The following solution is to apply Loon Ice-off, a paste that you apply to your rod guides. Loon ice-off does an incredible job, but you will need to apply it every 15 or 20 minutes, depending on how cold the weather is. Since the water on the fly line causes your rod guides to ice up, if you minimize your casting, you mitigate your rod guides from icing - a simple roll cast is a solution or try not casting as far. I will also fish my European nymphing rods because, in this style of fly fishing, your fly line never leaves your rod tip.

Winter fly fishing has many benefits, such as practicing this sport in solitude. I hope you found these tips helpful. You can still fish just because the riverbank is white and the temperatures are colder. You have something new to try if you haven't fished in winter.

Beginner Fly Pattern



Black & Red Ice Cream Cone

Hook: TMC 200R 10-8

Bead: White size to fit hook about 4.0 mm **Thread:** Black 6/0 or 8/0 or black Frostbite

Rib: Red wire


Abdomen: tapered black tying thread or black Frostbite

- **1.** Place a white bead on the hook, and place the hook in the vice. Start the thread behind the bead.
- 2. Wrap thread to above the barb of the hook, tie in red wire. Tie in black frostbite if you are using this product if not wrap thread to the bead making several layers building up a slightly tapered body. Stop behind the bead.
- **2b.** If you are using frostbite wrap a few layers of thread then wrap the black frostbite forward tying it off behind the bead.
- **3.** Wrap the red wire forward in a spaced spiral wrap forming a segmented rib. Tie off the wire behind the bead with several wraps of thread. When secured with wraps of thread, helicopter the extra wire off or trim it off and whip finish and apply head cement.
